The Unapproved uses of approved medications: Off-label prescribing

PURPOSE/GOALS

Approximately 30% of all prescribed medications are off-label and do not have FDA approval for the condition or the population being prescribed for. This presentation explores the role of the FDA in approving medications, beneficence versus maleficence in prescribing, and associated legalities. Finally, we will explore various medications that are commonly prescribed off-label and conditions for which medications are often prescribed off-label.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- · Review the role of the Food and Drug Administration in approving medications and the process for medication approval
- Evaluate the legalities associated with "off-label" prescribing and the evidence needed to justify off-label prescribing practices.
- Examine common drugs that are prescribed in primary care and their unapproved uses (e.g. conditions commonly prescribed for).

Approximately 13.7% of adults in the United States smoke cigarettes with another 27.5% of all teens having vaped or used an E-cig in the past 30 days. Vaping and tobacco use are associated with significant morbidity and mortality. It is essential that APRN's assess smoking status every visit and counsel patients about the importance of cessation.
